As we enter what we hope is the final furlong in what has surely been a marathon journey, I have been reminded of some words written by Aaron Lauritsen in his best selling work '100 Days Drive: The Great North American Road Trip'. Lauritsen writes *"There is strange comfort in knowing that no matter what happens today, the Sun will rise again tomorrow."* You might feel that there is a similarity in these words to a verse from the Volume of the Sacred Law. *"Don't worry about tomorrow. It will take care of itself. You have enough to worry about today."* I am sure my good friend

the Provincial Chaplain will have a view on this, and will doubtless consider a response in one of his excellent 'Thought For The Day' homilies. Having watched a news clip on the funeral of Captain Sir Tom Moore, what I get from these two quotes is a clearer understanding of what he meant when he said *"Tomorrow will be a better day."* He is right, and it will be.

Quotations, whether from the VSL, a ritual book, or an outstanding work of literature, can be instructive, comforting, inspiring, and motivational. Many quotes carry with them a moral, social or spiritual message; some can be very annoying, especially if the underlying message is one we just don't want to hear. I suppose it's not only quotes which have that effect. I am often told things which are important to the person telling me but which I don't necessarily want to hear. In these circumstances it's all to easy to shoot the messenger and ignore the message - which is not a particularly wise move. I mention this as guidance on a number of subjects is transmitted across the Province. Sometimes the message is not welcomed by the recipient, but that is not an acceptable excuse for being rude to the messenger. One of the principal virtues we expect to see practised by every Freemason is kindness. A lack of kindness towards each other is often cited as a major factor in Brethren becoming disaffected and leaving the Craft. Quite amazingly it is often the case that those Brethren who claim to be 'charitable' are seemingly more likely to be guilty of being discourteous and rude to their fellow Brethren. The author JM Barrie wrote "Always try to be a little kinder than is necessary." Today could be the right time to recalibrate, to imitate that what you see praiseworthy in others, while recognising the need to amend any defects in behaviour.

Thank you to all the Lodges which have responded to the Provincial Secretary advising of plans to hold meetings during the summer months. I know some Lodges are planning to hold multiple meetings in order to welcome in to Freemasonry good men who have patiently been waiting to be initiated.

The Provincial Secretary tells me he has heard from Masonic Halls which will be displaying a banner celebrating **NHS Social Care and Frontline Workers' Day** on Monday 5th July. This is a really fantastic opportunity for us to show our appreciation of NHS and Care workers.

Finally, I am absolutely delighted to mention and congratulate ten Wiltshire Freemasons, each of whom received a very special Certificate of Commendation from the MW Grand Master HRH The Duke of Kent (see page 3). The certificate recognised their outstanding contribution to Freemasonry's role in the nation's fight against Covid-19, and I am sure you will join me in extending to them the Province's heartiest congratulations.

Not many people know this....

No private Lodge is permitted to use the Arms of the United Grand Lodge of England; or that any design used as a Lodge emblem, whether on summonses, Lodge stationery, or as a Lodge banner must first be approved or allowed by the MW The Grand Master.



With the increasing use of social media and the ease with which emblems can be designed and placed on media sites, it has become

necessary to review the use of logos, emblems and designs being used throughout the Province. The purpose of the review is not to prevent the use of such emblems, but to make sure the use is properly authorised. The use of emblems, especially those containing items of a heraldic nature are unlikely to be approved, and even Arms which are extinct may not be used unless written permission to use them was given before they became extinct.

Many Lodges in the distant past have had banners made, or included designs on their Summons or paperwork without first seeking and obtaining proper approval. A banner may therefore be extremely old but its renewal may not be approved because no permission for the previous design existed and the design may not be approvable.

Is your Lodge using an unauthorised design on your lodge Summons, stationery or social media sites (Facebook, Twitter and Instagram). During the coming months members of the Communication Team will be asking Lodge secretaries to confirm whether or not the Lodge has permission
